## Tennis Meet Will Be Held on Club Courts Tomorrow —Yachtsmen in Hayward Memorial Cup Races

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**B**AR HARBOR—The international tennis tournament between players of the British and United States Navies is finished and tomorrow younger members of the colony will take over the courts. Play will be in two classes of mixed doubles, one for boys and girls under 16, and one for those between 16 and 20, for the eight silver cups which the club is offering to the winners and runners-up.

The club's bridge tournaments, under the direction of Miss Choate, have been moved from Monday evenings to Tuesdays, and now end merrily in the Midnight Cabaret, which is a novel feature of the club's program this year.

It is open to the yachts of all racing classes and is known as a "chowder race," that is, the yachts all receive handicaps at the start and the first yacht to cross the line wins. The name of the winning yacht is engraved on the cup and its owner receives a replica.
